


















































School Closures

Close the school and enroll students in other, higherachieving schools.



Partnership with the Early College High School Initiative Schools are designed so that low-income youth, first-generation college goers, English language learners, students of color, and other underrepresented populations are able to earn both their high school diploma and an Associate's degree or up to two years of college credit for free (Early College High School Initiative, 2012).





Funding Early College High Schools


A pilot study of budgets suggests that early college high school can range from 5 percent to 12 percent more than the cost of a regular public high school


Additional study shows that the return on investment from early college high schools yields significant benefits for students, communities, and states (Webb, 2004) (Palaich, 2006).
